It can be done on an even or odd number of stitches in the case of flat knitting.

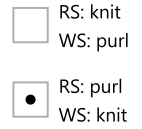
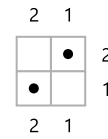
Ligne 1 (RS): K1, p1.

Next rows : Knit the stitches in the reverse order of the stitch shown.

Instructions

It is advisable to do it on an even number of stitches as this avoids an aesthetic problem on the starting point of the row. Because in the case of an odd number there will be identical successive cells.

Row 1 (RS): K1, p1.

Next rows : Knit the stitches in the reverse order of the stitch shown.

To be easy, the trick is in alternating knit and purl stitches on the next row. In fact, the stitches that occur in the place are purl and vice versa.

Knit the stitches in the reverse order of the stitch shown: if there is a loop then knit or if there is a V, purl
